How A Roundabout Works

A modern roundabout is a type of intersection whereby entering traffic yields to oncoming traffic from the drivers left. Traffic already within the roundabout has the right of way. When an approaching driver sees a gap in the traffic, they enter the roundabout and proceed until they need to make a right turn at their desired exit point.

How To Go Through A Roundabout

Motorists:

- Slow down and watch for traffic signs.
- Yield to pedestrians and bicyclists as you enter and exit the roundabout.
- Enter the roundabout after yielding to traffic on your left. Be prepared to stop.
- Keep your speed low within the roundabout. Speeds of 15 mph or less are necessary.
- Once you enter the roundabout, do not stop.
- Exit the roundabout with a right turn at the desired exit point.

Bicyclists:

- Use the sidewalk and proceed as a pedestrian.
- Watch for traffic entering and within the roundabout. They may not be looking for you.
- Use the islands as a midway stopping point and again look for oncoming traffic before completing crossing the roadway.

Pedestrians:

- At the curbside, look for traffic entering and within the roundabout. They may not be looking for you.
- Use the islands as a midway stopping point and again look for oncoming traffic before completing crossing the roadway.
- Do not cross the roadway to reach the central island.
